Guidelines for Taking a Winning Photo

1. Make sure the photo clearly shows you're talking about translation and/or interpreting.

- Words behind you on a whiteboard, chalkboard, or flip chart; an interesting prop; or classroom decorations such as flags, foreign vocabulary or maps.
- Visual interest improves the quality of your photograph and makes your presentation more interesting and engaging.

2. Include yourself and one or more students in the photo if you can.

• If the school's confidentiality policy prohibits showing children's faces in the photo, try a shot that shows them from the back.

3. Aim for a photo that's clear enough for effective reproduction in *The ATA Chronicle* and promotional materials.

• It should be visually pleasing as well, although we're willing to do some cropping and enhancing if the content is good.

4. Plan your photo ahead of time!

- Think of what you want the photo to look like and prepare props or interactive activities specifically for the photo.
- Leave at least 10 minutes at the end of your presentation for taking the photo.
- Tell the teacher about your plans so it isn't a surprise, and ask about the school's confidentiality policy (can the children's faces appear in the photo?)
- Plan who is going to take the photo.
 - The teacher, school newspaper or yearbook.
 - Invite a family member, translator colleague or friend.
