Re: Opposition to AB 1032 (Pacheco)

AB 1032 proposes changes to existing law that threaten to turn back the clock on more than two decades of progress by lawmakers to strengthen due process and equal access to justice for

linguistic minorities in the California courts.

We are a coalition of veteran certified and registered court interpreters with decades of experience working in the California courts as employees and contractors, including current and former union members. We have worked to advance professional standards and to strengthen labor conditions for court interpreters, we have served on Judicial Council task forces and committees, and we have contributed as language access advocates, stewards, elected union officers and staff, and as educators specialized in legal interpreting.

We strongly support protecting and expanding meaningful access for linguistic minorities and increasing access to good union jobs with benefits. We urge you to reject AB 1032.

AB 1032 is a hodgepodge of misguided provisions that lacks a clear purpose. The bill would *not* increase the availability of qualified interpreters to the courts. It would leave more interpreters without benefits, erode our bargaining power and degrade language access standards. In short, it would do harm to both linguistic minorities and to our livelihoods.

The bill's sponsor, the California Federation of Interpreters (CFI), did not consult with or inform its members before introducing this bill, nor did it seek input from other stakeholders, including working interpreters, legal and language-access advocates, or the communities we serve. To garner support from interpreters and community organizations, the sponsors are promoting the bill as a pathway to benefitted union jobs for relay interpreters and contractors, but in fact the bill does *not* provide benefitted positions for either and dangerously deteriorates language access for indigenous communities.

AB 1032 would institutionalize the use of untested relay interpreters for indigenous language speakers by eliminating current restrictions that allow for provisional use only. It would allow

ongoing employment of untested relay interpreters for these communities exclusively while maintaining current restrictions for all other languages. Lowering the required standards of competence for indigenous languages would establish a separate and unequal standard of justice for these vulnerable communities and set a dangerous precedent for all linguistic minorities.

A recent amendment to AB 1032 requiring that the hiring court have certified employees available to pair with untested relay interpreters does not rectify the problem. It protects accuracy for only half of the communication without requiring that the relay interpreter prove Spanish proficiency. A provision establishing a 45-day limit on the use of contracted non-certified/non-registered interpreters may seem good in theory but would prove detrimental for indigenous languages for which demand outstrips supply and no credentialing pathway exists.

AB 1032 would also require courts to hire a potentially unlimited number of as-needed employees into a confusingly redundant pro tempore employment category. The positions come with the questionable requirement that courts shall pay new hires more than current staff. As-needed interpreters – some with benefits, some without – have already been working in courts in every region in the state since the start of the employment system. A cloned intermittent classification will generate disputes and clearly complicate bargaining in the state's four multi-employer regions.

This new category of employment will hardly persuade contractors to trade in the proven negotiating power they now hold as free agents. More troubling, the introduction of limitless protem positions with no guarantee of hours or benefits would certainly undermine the existence of full-time positions-and would inevitably erode the bargaining power of unionized interpreters as a whole.

Amendments with permissive language that courts *may* provide recruitment incentives, bonuses and COLA's change nothing of substance. The courts have always been authorized to do so. The language only provides, at best, that interpreters in some places will receive bonuses provided to other employees. Our bargaining history. and unclear language in the bill around uniform compensation, undermine the prospects of more meaningful base wage gains.

Overall, AB 1032 fails to address the fundamental cause of the courts' problem with recruiting and retaining enough fully qualified, certified and registered interpreters. It ignores underlying realities in the marketplace for skilled legal interpreters, including demand in other sectors and a history of disparate treatment and depressed court interpreter wages for both staff and contractors

Judges, lawyers, court reporters and clerks in state courts earn pay comparable to, if not higher than, their federal counterparts. Only interpreters are subject to a gaping disparity between state and federal wages. California courts pay us 40% less than our counterparts in federal courts.

Lowering language access standards for indigenous populations and eroding access to jobs with adequate pay, hours and benefits would only exacerbate long-term job vacancies across the state and daily shortages that leave litigants unserved and cases unheard.

This state of affairs begs the question of whether the trial courts' decades-long disparate treatment of interpreters in pay and professional recognition is rooted in the broader systemic discrimination against linguistic minorities, based on national origin. AB 1032 would only create additional pretexts to further erode language access and due process in the trial courts:

- The Judicial Council has long sought to lower certification standards rather than pay professional interpreters fair wages that reflect the skills, knowledge and experience required to provide meaningful language access even though the Legislature has consistently provided funds to improve and expand language services.
- The courts are currently expanding the use of ad hoc remote interpreting without appropriate technology, restrictions or protocols, and we regularly experience the damaging impact this has on access and interpreter performance.
- Courts are increasingly using remote interpreters from out of state and even abroad, particularly for languages of lesser diffusion, including indigenous languages.

These developments undermine mandates by the California Legislature and United States Department of Justice to expand and improve language access in all court proceedings pursuant to Title VI of the Civil Rights Act. The California State Legislature would do well to thoroughly investigate and rectify these issues.

We have decades of experience working in the California courts and advocating for professional and ethical language access. From our perspective, AB 1032 is fundamentally flawed, and the muddled language of the amendments put forward fail to address the serious issues raised in opposition.

There are far stronger and more meaningful steps that can be taken to protect union jobs and increase access to competent interpreters in California courts. A transparent and inclusive process with all stakeholders, including rank and file interpreters, would be the starting point. We urge you to identify more effective measures to protect language rights and the integrity of the judicial system.
